Motivation and Persistence for Adult Learners – Part 5

The following are scaffolding strategies to help teachers unpack assignments to help students better understand an activity:

- 1- Be more specific in the assignment prompts. For example, give students a list of items to write about and have each one develop a presentation.
- 2- Change the assignment to let students choose any topic from the textbook.
- 3- Have students brainstorm/list causes of a particular problem.
- 4- Have students submit their topics for approval before they begin work on the project.
- 5- Have students watch videos about the topic.
- 6- Have students select causes and find solutions to the problem at hand.
- 7- Have students write out their speeches word for word and memorize them.
- 8- Have students submit an outline before they begin working on their presentations.
- 9- Change the assignment to be a small-group project that students prepare.
- 10- Show students a sample project form a past student.
- 11- Provide students with a rubric showing how they will be graded.
- 12-Specify what a poster (if requested) will include.
- 13- Give students a chance to practice (rehearse) in small groups before they present to the whole class.
- 14- Give students the opportunity to self-assess and reflect.
- 15- Give students alternative ways to submit the assignment (a video, an essay, a slideshow, etc.) (From Communities of Practice, a CALPRO project by Kristi Reyes, Mariam Thacher and Sudie Whalen, April 2019)

BLACK HISTORY MONTH - INVENTORS (excerpts from biography.com)

In the spirit of Black History Month, here are some of the greatest inventors you did not know:



Scientist George Carruthers, Ph.D. in aeronautical and astronautical engineering, worked at the US Naval Research Laboratory. His telescope and image converter was used to identify molecular hydrogen in space. His ultraviolet camera or spectrograph was used by NASA in the 1972 Apollo 16 flight, revealing the mysteries of space and the Earth's atmosphere.



Patricia Bath, first ophthalmologist and first female faculty member in the Department of Ophthalmology at UCLA's Jules Stein Eye Institute. Co-founded the American Institute for the Prevention of Blindness. Invented and patented the Laserphaco Probe, to treat cataract patients. First African American female doctor to receive a medical patent.




Computer scientist and engineer Mark Dean is credited with the development a number of landmark technologies for IBM, including the color PC monitor, the first gigahertz chip, and the Industry Standard Architecture system bus, which allows plug-ins such as disk drives and printers. He holds three of the company's original nine patents.



Granville T. Woods held various engineering and industrial jobs before establishing a company to develop electrical apparatus. Known as "Black Edison," he registered nearly 60 patents in his lifetime, including a telephone transmitter, a trolley wheel and the multiplex telegraph (over which he defeated a lawsuit by Thomas Edison).




Percy Julian was a pioneering chemist responsible for the chemical synthesis of drugs such as cortisone, steroids and birth control pills to treat glaucoma and arthritis. Although his race presented challenges at every turn, he is regarded as one of the most influential chemists in American history.



George Washington Carver was born into slavery. However, he went on to become one of the most prominent scientists and inventors of his time. He was also a teacher at the Tuskegee Institute. Carver devised over 100 products using one major crop — the peanut — including dyes, plastics, and gasoline.
